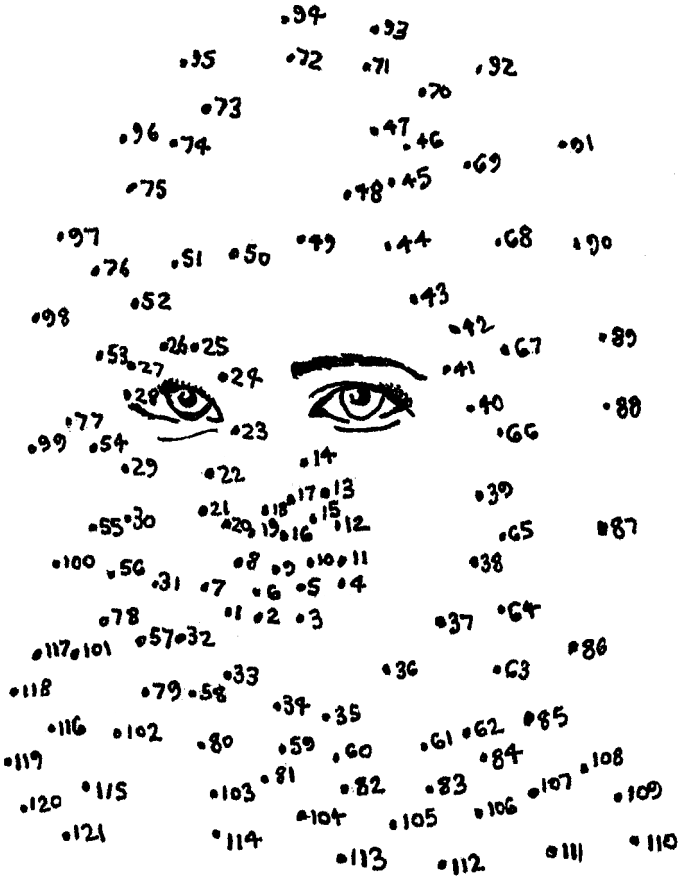


Malala Yousafzai

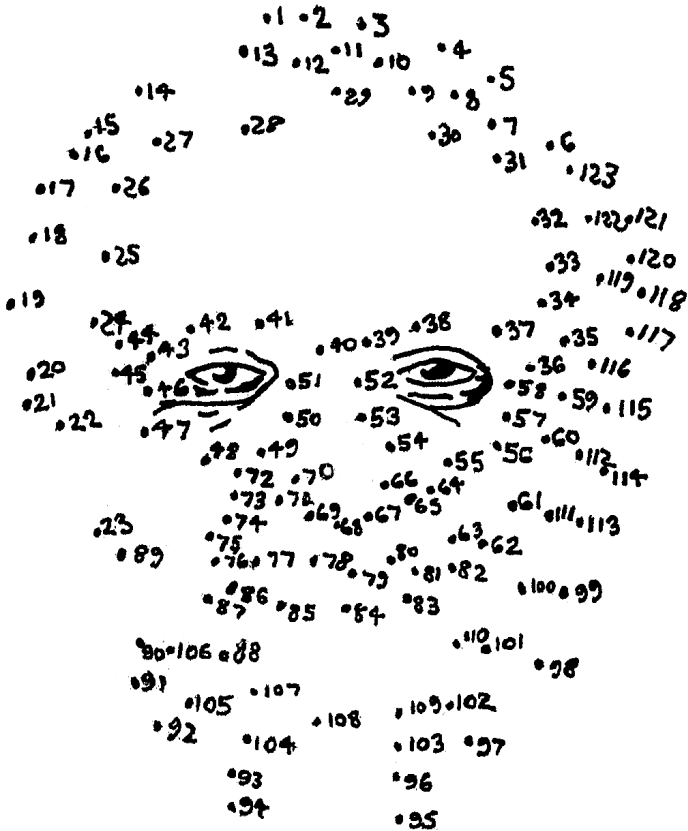


“We were scared, but our fear was not as strong as our courage.”

Desmond Tutu

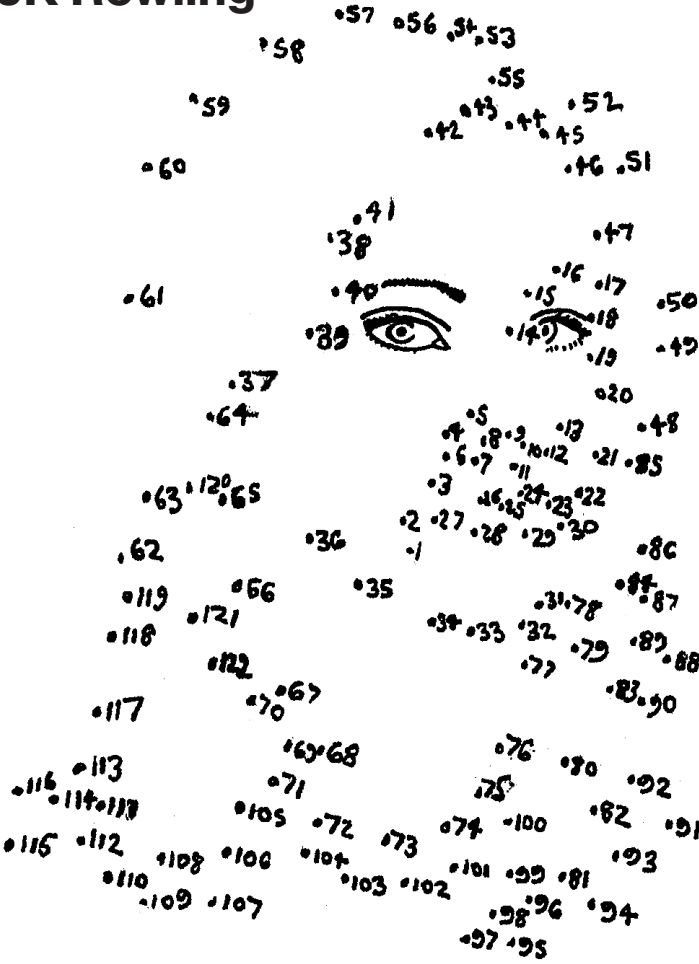


“My humanity is bound up in yours,

JK Rowling

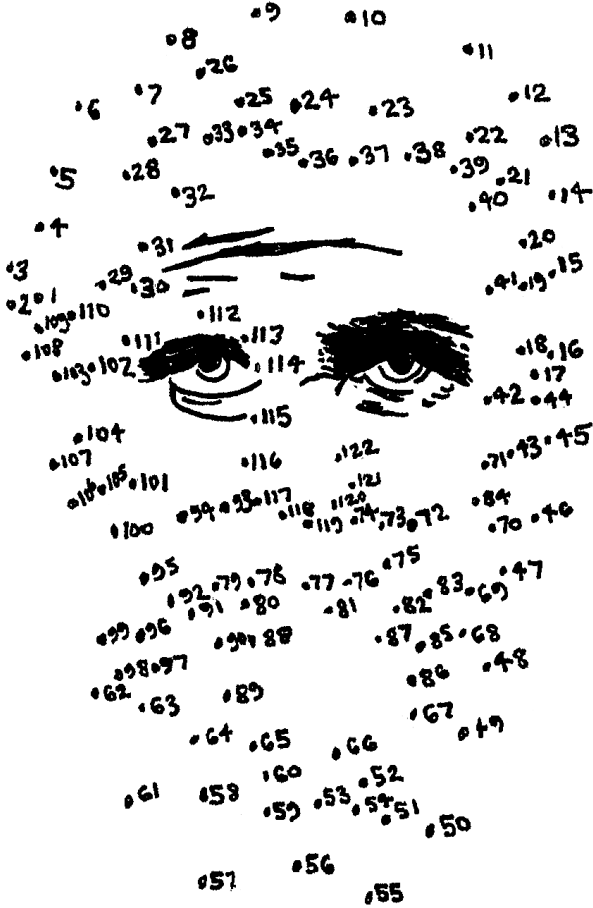

Abraham Lincoln

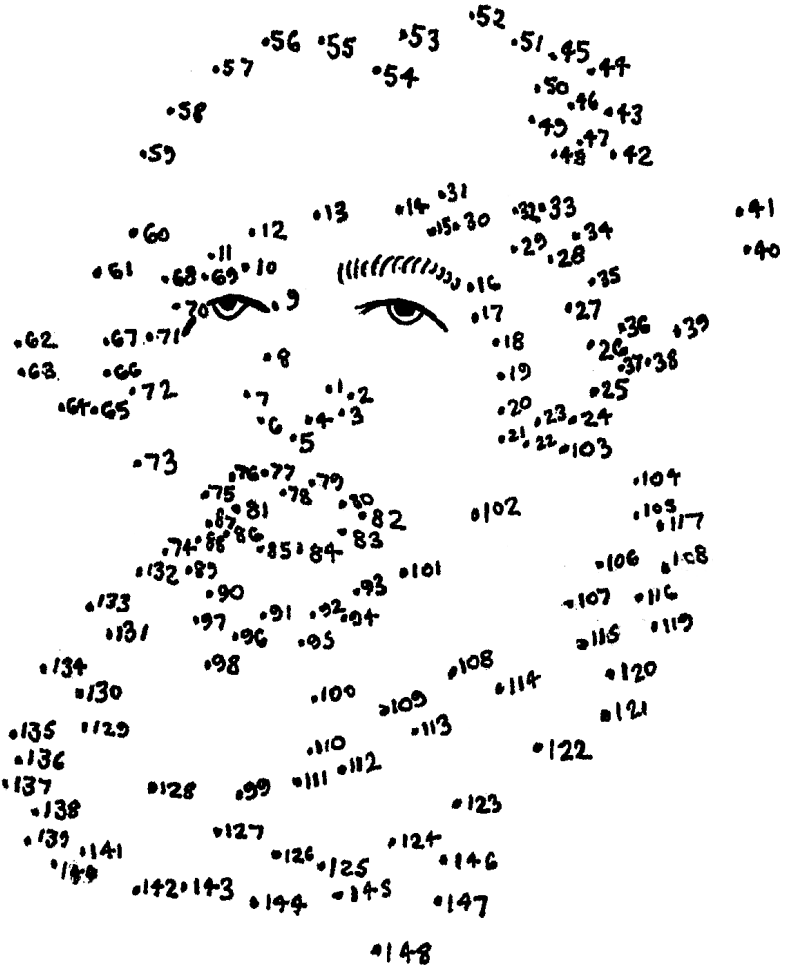

The wife of President Franklin D Roosevelt, Eleanor was an introvert who became one of the most outspoken First Ladies in the White House. She became politically active by writing a newspaper column, giving press conferences, lectures, speaking out on women's rights, poverty, racism and drafting the UN Bill on Human Rights. She became a spokesperson in the UN overcoming her shyness and was known for her graciousness and sincerity of purpose.

Instructions

- 1 Pierce the dots with your needle to create holes.
- 2 Thread your needle. Starting on dot 2 do a basic back stitch to dot 1 then move to do 3 and back to 2.
- 3 Reflect on your crafter-thoughts whilst stitching alone, or discuss in a group.
